My Military Diary

In 1964, as a junior in high school, I decided to pursue a career in the United States Army. I applied to and was accepted by <u>The Citadel</u>, The Military College of South Carolina. I had only a vague idea about where this path would eventually take me.

On a hot, humid September 7, 1965, my parents and I drove though the main gate of the campus and around the parade grounds, arriving in front of #2 Barracks, the Padgett-Thomas Barracks. From there I was directed to #3 Barracks, the Law Barracks, where I would live for the next four years. After quick goodbyes to my mother and father, I was plunged into Cadre Week, also known as "Hell Week." Cadre Week preceded the return of the Corps of Cadets from summer break. As an aside, 3rd Classmen did not have a summer break, and they instead spent their summers in platoon leaders' classes at Ft. Benning, Ft. Bragg or one of the airbases, such as Shaw, McGuire or MacDill.



The next four years were a blur of academic classes, parades, inspections and PT (physical training). Despite the rigors of the program, I became Company Ist Sergeant and then Company Commander my senior year. Finally, on May 31st, 1969 the seniors marched across the parade grounds for the final time. We then entered Summeral Chapel to take our oath of office, agreeing to serve, defend and protect the Constitution of the United States of America. At that point, we became commissioned Officers of the United States Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines, and we marched to the north end of the parade grounds to receive our diplomas from no less than General Mark Clark, who had defeated the German army in southern Europe and had liberated Italy, General Hugh Harris, one of Gen Eisenhower's staff officers during the Normandy Invasion, and Major General Reuben H. Tucker of the 82nd Airborne, who had led his airborne troops of the 506 PIR (Parachute Infantry Regiment) when they jumped into Holland during Operation Market Garden.

I may have left the comforts and familiarity of The Citadel in May of '69, but I was forever tied to my 400 adopted brothers. Most of us knew where we were going, but we were invincible. As a result of our shared experiences and robust traditions (and surviving Cadre Week), we had become a true Band of Brothers and we are still close today staying in contact, worrying about each other and toasting those who did not return from those damned beautiful rice paddies and forests.



My journey continued in the hills of Kentucky in July of 1969, Armor Officers Basic, Class 7/69. Two of my close friends from The Citadel and I were given a 60 ton monster, 120,000 pounds of steel with a full combat load of high velocity ammunition. And then a Gunnery instructor said, "Go blow stuff up." It was every 21 year old's dream. An M-60 tank will do 45 mph over an open field, and 60 tons of steel going 45 m.p.h. is both intimidating and frightening. What we were not told at first was that while we got to ride around in the beast, we also had to maintain it. Our duties included washing it using a fire hose every afternoon, lubing it, changing oil and the ever popular humping ammo. The worst was when it would throw a track, usually on Friday afternoon right before Happy Hour at the Officer's club.

After Ft. Knox I was selected for the Army's Military Intelligence School at Ft. Holabird in Baltimore, Maryland. There were two Military Occupational Specialties that I desired: 9666 (Special Agent) and 9668 (Area Specialist). I was selected for Special Agent. When school began, we were trained in conducting background investigations for security clearances, interrogation techniques, surveillance both foot and vehicular and how to do an illegal border crossing.

Upon graduation from Intel school I received my badge and credentials, and I was assigned to Tampa Field office, Region III, I I I th Military Intelligence group. I arrived in Tampa to find I was already the Executive Officer. The other personnel included a Major, two other 1st Lieutenants, two Warrant officers, one polygraph operator and one an MP Criminal investigator, and eight enlisted special agents, all sergeants. The office also had six one- and two-man satellite offices from Pensacola to Ft. Myers along the Gulf Coast. We conducted background investigations for security clearances and for anyone in the area being promoted to the rank of General Officer. We also conducted security sweeps of military facilities and conducted investigations of security breaches. My polygraph operator performed polygraphs on foreign nationals in the military, and he also did polygraphs for the FBI. After six months in Tampa, I was promoted to Commanding Officer.

As all good things come to an end, in the summer of 1972 I received orders to deploy to Southeast Asia. The time between July and August was not a happy time in the Kipphut house. I flew from McGuire AFB to Anchorage Alaska to Japan, arriving at Ton Son Nhut Airbase 23 hours later. We finally landed around midnight, and it was HOT, humid, dark and noisy. We were loaded onto school buses and driven to the 90th Replacement station to be processed.





Two days later I was picked up by my detachment clerk who promptly told me I was the new "Meat" Lieutenant. He also told me not to do anything stupid. Words to live by in Viet Nam. I had been assigned to the Saigon Support Command, and you're probably thinking Saigon, NOT TOO SHABBY. Problem is, in the Army if they had an Ocean City Support Command it would be in Pennsauken. Be that as it may, the support command was located on an abandoned French rubber plantation. When the French left they apparently took all the trees. Our job was to provide intel support to the III Corps Commander and to Mr. Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker, a skinny little man who always wore a white linen suit and was always driven around in a black Cadillac. Surprisingly, that combination was not as unique as it sounds. My duties also included picking up captured documents from field units to be translated, and two other agents and I were sometimes called upon to interview Vietnamese nationals for local intel.

My least favorite duty was detachment Motor Officer. I was responsible for the maintenance and availability of all of our jeeps, 2-1/2 ton trucks and trailers. Some fun. Ask me about one of my sergeants who had his jeep stolen . . .

I guess my most rewarding experience was my involvement with the local Vietnamese orphanage in Bien Hoa village. One of myfriends, LT. Frenchy Franzblau from Newark, NJ introduced me to Sister Cecelia, a small, no nonsense nun who had turned a local abandoned Catholic church into an orphanage. For whatever reason we took a liking to each other and I decided to make life a little better for those kids. At first I started to get food from the mess hall, then towels and blankets, and after awhile I was writing home to family and friends asking for clothing, toys and money. The kids moved me, mainly I guess because I had two daughters, and these kids were like my kids. That Christmas I arranged a huge party with food and cake. One of my best Christmases. I often wonder what ever became of them and Sister Cecelia.

While so many of you were working hard setting up and hopefully also enjoying the Cavalcade back at the end of June, four of your fellow club members were heading to Virginia International Raceway to participate in the National Corvette Museum's driving school event. Val, Glenn and I all drive in the event and Yvonne plays the role of our team manager. Short of a driving school, which Val wrote about so eloquently a couple of months ago, there is no better way to get your feet wet with putting your car on track. I've been over the track day concepts before, so let's make this more of a travelogue.

Val and I had picked up our brand new 24' stacker trailer a week before we left and boy did we have a learning curve to navigate! Glenn was, as always, a great friend and gave us some pointers in driving with it, parking it, and we called on him last minute to help us get the cars loaded in. Getting a car up onto the lift inside the trailer is quite a challenge! We have it pretty well figured out now, but mid-week a couple of days before we were to leave it put a lot of pressure on. Glenn was called upon last minute to help us out, and being him of course he showed up and was great help.



We headed out the day of the Cavalcade and stayed the night in Farmville, VA at the Longwood Bed & Breakfast, a place found of course by our team manager. The house is owned by Longwood University and was formerly the President's house, built at the end of the 19th century. It is a beautiful place with a ton of charm, including **THREE** sets of pocket doors downstairs! The price of the stay was practically worth it for the breakfast the next morning alone. I've never had such perfectly cooked bacon.

Sunday morning we drove the rest of the way down to the Days Inn in Danville, VA which the Museum uses as a base of operations. The parking lots full of Corvettes, including a pair of C7's, is quite a sight. Everybody has to go through tech inspection where they make sure your car is safe to go on track. Once you

have your inspection stickers (one for the car, one for your helmet) you're all set. We were staying at the Lodge at the VIR facility rather than at the Days Inn so we headed over to the track where we were able to unload the trailer and get setup for the next 2 days of track fun. The only disappointment on the day was that by the time we unloaded and got cleaned up our favorite little dive pizza joint/bar in Milton, NC (you pass into and then back out of NC while driving from Danville into VIR), Aunt Millie's was closed.

We were joined by a friend of ours from New Jersey Motorsports Park plus a co-worker of his that was attending the event so we were a group of 4 cars. Glenn, Dom and I were all running in Advanced Intermediate (aka "Blue Group) and Val and Dom's friend were running in Intermediate (aka "Yellow Group). Yvonne was working on the minutes from the June CCDV board meeting and getting the scoop on offmenu delights that we would sample the next evening at the Oak Tree Tavern, though the latter was far more interesting than the former as the info was acquired at VIR's spa!



We had two great days of track time over the pair of typically very warm end-of-June Southern Virginia days, though the days were not without their problems for the attendees. Two more LS7's went up in massive clouds of smoke, no doubt dropping valves and self-destructing just as ours did in our '08 last year. Also there were many more spins and cars that had to be towed out of the grass than we had ever seen at that event, resulting in far too many black flags and shortened sessions. Fortunately none of those black or yellow flags were for any of our group of friends and the only things hurt were engines and cars, not people.





We did get to our favorite pizza dive that Monday, but the culinary highlight of the trip was Tuesday evening's dinner at the Oak Tree Tavern. There's a new sheriff in town in the kitchen there since last we went and WOW what a difference! The food was always good at the Tavern, not special but good, but now it is a don't-miss experience. Chef Consuelo Price has done a great job, adding her Southern flair to traditional restaurant fare resulting in wonderful flavors. Yvonne had heard about these special Southern-style egg rolls made with greens and stuffed with sausage and ham and more greens, served with a mango salsa. The dish was not on the menu but it had been the previous weekend and our waitress was kind enough to ask the chef if there were any servings left and we were very fortunate to be able to enjoy the two they had left. The appetizers, including "gator bites", were so flavorful and filling we turned the Tavern into a tapas place and wound up ordering a few more appetizers and sampling. As can likely be determined from the number of words I've written, it was all very good! It was, as it has always been, a special trip with great friends and we can't wait until next year!

Unfortunately I can't help but to end this with a sad note. A week after the Museum event the eponymous tree at the track's signature Oak Tree corner snapped at its base. Though it may be a bit odd to mourn a tree, she was a grand lady and I feel privileged to have had the opportunity to hang on for dear life pressed against the driver's door going under her branches and around her trunk.



The Way Way Back

Years ago, I bought a 1973 Mercury Monterey station wagon when I accepted my first job in Philadelphia. It was a big, cavernous, beast of a car that held all of my earthly belongings for my move from Florida. A "nine passenger" model, it featured fold up seats in the very rear of the car; seats that were "way way back."

The new movie "The Way Way Back" from Fox Searchlight opens with a scene inside a vintage 1970 Buick Estate Wagon with dialogue that sets the stage for this delightful and touching comedy drama.

There is no shortage of summer "coming of age" movies . "Stand By Me," "Superbad," and "The Sandlot" may be some of the better examples. The new offering, written and directed by Nat Faxon and Jim Rash may be the best.

Liam James plays the role of Duncan, a fourteen year old who endures the agony of a summer beach vacation with his divorced mother Pam, (Toni Collette), her mean spirited philandering boyfriend Trent (Steve Carell) and his older sister who could fit right in with "mean girls." The four arrive at Trent's summer beach house. There is comic relief from an alcohol-fueled next door neighbor, her fetching teen daughter and nerd son.


Duncan is the picture of awkward as he can't fit in with partying adults or older teens who shun him on the beach. He does manage to attract the attention of the pretty next door teen daughter, and the manager of a local amusement park called "Water Wizz" where he finds summer employment. Animosity develops between Duncan and Trent.

The second act ushers in one of the summer movie season's most memorable characters: Owen, the water park manager played by Sam Rockwell. His frenetic humor and energy captivate young Duncan, who commutes to his summer job on a neon colored girls bike. Despite Owen's cavalier life, his deep down wisdom honed by experience impresses young Duncan as he tends to amusing water park escapades. There are lessons to be learned about broken families and finding your own way.

Dialogue is funny, crisp and touching at times. While there is a lot to like about the cast, you may be surprised at how much you could hate a character played by the usually likable Carell. Maya Rudolph and Rob Corddry have supporting roles.

Amid the roar and sensory overload of this year's bloated budget offerings at the movies, "The Way Way Back" is welcome and satisfying relief.



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
