MEMBERS' CORNER

2002 C5 Corvette Fuel Sender Replacement

C5 Corvettes have a common problem with the fuel gauge, where the senders develop sulfur buildup and as a result the gauge reads erratically or not at all. Many report that the problem can be corrected at least temporarily with the regular use of Chevron Techron fuel additive, but even that may stop working after a while, necessitating the replacement of the fuel level sending units.

In mid model year 2003, the C5 fuel system was revised to be more similar to the C6 design; sender replacement is more difficult on those vehicles. But for 1998 - 2003 C5s, the senders are much more accessible and replacement is fairly easy; we were able to change the senders out for both the left and right side fuel tanks on my 2002 in about 6 hours; the procedure should be very similar for any other 1998 - 2002 C5. The most difficult part is draining the fuel to empty the tanks, once that's done the rest of the sender replacement is straightforward.

I referred to various sources around the internet prior to and during the replacement, but the following two were particularly helpful:

- As the driver's side sending unit and main electric fuel pump are a single module, these <u>Lingenfelter C5</u> replacement fuel pump installation instructions (backup copy here) came in very handy, as most of the procedure is identical.
- This Super Chevy article was also good.

I purchased the following GM parts:

10333749 left (driver's) side fuel level sender. The driver's side electric fuel pump and level sender are a single module; but this part number replaces the sender only, retaining the rest of the pump/sender module including the main electric fuel pump. The box also included a new fuel sock and o-ring that we didn't use (keeping the original sock and o-ring); installation instructions, and a gray plastic "Terminal Positive Assurance (TPA)" clip used when inserting the new sender leads into the existing electrical connector.



12459863 left/right side fuel module gasket and bolts - we needed to buy this separately for the left side
as we were not replacing the complete left-side pump/sender module, but rather the sender only. The bag
included installation instructions showing tightening sequence and torque spec (6.5 N-m).



- 19354302 right (passenger's) side sender. This is a complete module including the sender and jet pump. GM includes a gasket and bolts for the right side module identical to the one we needed to purchase separately for the left side.

We also had a fuel pump on hand to drain the fuel - this is not strictly required however. It is possible to jump the fuel pump relay to use the car's fuel pump to drain the tank, although that's not described here.

Appropriate containers will be required to receive the drained fuel. It's best to run the tanks down as low as possible before starting. The car will need to be lifted high enough to locate the containers beneath the car.



We'd incorrectly assumed that the wheel well tubs would need to be removed, and that spare plastic body-panel rivets would be required -- it turned out that we did not need to remove the wheel well, and that the wheel well is attached with screws only, no plastic rivets.

To replace the driver's side fuel level sender:


<u>Step 1.</u> Drain as much fuel from the tanks as possible. We disconnected the fuel line in the engine compartment by removing the retaining clip, undoing the quick-disconnect with a special tool, and then attaching a fuel pump.



Alternately, not shown here, there is also a bicycle-type Schraeder fuel valve under the valve cover; fuel can be drained by removing the valve stem, connecting a suitable fuel line to the valve, and jumping the C5's fuel pump relay in the fuse box.

Step 2. Remove the rear driver's side wheel.

<u>Step 3</u> was to remove the wheel well tub - but as we found out, we didn't need to do this at all. Skip this step, leave the tubs in place, don't remove them!



<u>Step 4.</u> There is an aluminum pan protecting each tank. Each pan is two-piece. Access to the fuel module is gained by using 10 & 13 mm sockets and wrenches to completely remove the rear piece of the pan, and loosening the front piece enough for it to hang down an inch or two.



In the following photo of the left (driver's) side module, the electrical connector has already been disconnected and is hanging loose. There are 3 color-coded (green, blue, black) fuel lines which must be removed. One of the bolt holes is on the module is identified by the factory with a short engraved line, circled in red below:



<u>Step 5.</u> After the electrical connector and three fuel lines quick disconnects are detached, carefully remove the 6 bolts, being careful to collect any remaining gasoline that drains out.



<u>Step 6.</u> Note the orientation of the driver's side fuel module. Slide the module out of the tank, but only by about 4 to 6 inches. Do not remove it completely yet. Move the sender arm, noting its complete range of motion.



<u>Step 7.</u> If you've also been referring to the linked <u>Lingenfelter fuel pump replacement instructions</u>, the procedure has been identical up to this point - but now, we're going to replace the driver's side level sender instead of the pump.


Some recommend to remove the pump and sender module completely, but we found it easier to leave it in place. Complete removal would be required to replace the fuel sock and/or to change the fuel pump.

The sender (white plastic part in the photo above, complete with the float arm) is attached to the module with nothing more than two plastic tabs - it's a tight fit though, and took a bit of pushing and pulling and wiggling to get the sender to release from the module.

We cut the blue and gray wires attaching the sender to the module via the black plastic connector. The black ground wires are temporarily disconnected to provide a bit more working room. Pull the old sender out of the tank and discard the sender. Make note of the location of the blue and gray wires in the black connector (and/or refer to the photos below):



<u>Step 8.</u> With the old sender now out of the way, the remaining blue and gray wires from the old sender must be removed from the black electrical connector. The gray plastic "TPA" retainer tab must be pried out of the black connector - it will probably break when it's pried out, but that's OK, GM gives you a new one with the new sender for that reason. Once the TPA connector is out, the metal terminations on the wires can be released from the black connector by inserting a small pick or jeweler's screwdriver into the metal release tab on the face of the black connector. See the linked GM instructions for additional details.



<u>Step 9.</u> Slide the new sender into the tank, and snap the plastic tabs into the plate on the module. Make sure it travels freely through its full range of motion without obstruction.

Reconnect the black ground wires. Insert the new blue and gray wires into the black electrical connector. Lock the wires in place with the new gray plastic "TPA" clip.

Install the gasket and bolt the module in place using the new bolts provided by GM and following the GM tightening sequence and torque spec from the gasket installation instructions. Reconnect the three fuel lines and the wiring harness.



Replace the aluminum pan beneath the fuel tank, reinstall the wheel, and the drivers side is done.

<u>The right (passenger's) side level sender replacement</u> is nearly identical but easier, as the complete module will be replaced.

<u>Step 10:</u> Remove the passenger side wheel, and lower the protective aluminum pan beneath the right side tank, just as was done for the other side. Disconnect the electrical connector. There are only 2 fuel lines on this side -- blue and black -- disconnect those, and be ready to collect some more gas from the module fuel ports. Slowly and carefully remove the six bolts holding the right side module in - and be ready to catch yet more gasoline when the bolts are removed. I think we collected about 2-3 more gallons in total from the right side tank.



<u>Step 11:</u> Once the gas is done draining, remove the module from the tank. Using a small pick or screwdriver, release the quick fuel disconnects from the from the old module and move them to the new module.




<u>Step 12:</u> Reattach the fuel lines and wiring harness. Reinstall the aluminum pans and rear wheel. Reconnect the fuel line inside the engine bay. Once about 3-4 gallons of gas are added, you should find you have a working gas gauge! Success!



You can see the crud that had built up on the old sender in the photo right:

Although we spent much time on the replacement, the newly-working fuel gauge was worth the effort!


